JANUARY: COREL WOOS MEMBERS



January was both "cool" and "hot" when it came to a speaker presentation. Corel Corporation's Tanya Lux's second visit to Chalmette Computer Users' Group was as thorough as it gets, considering she discussed a minimum of almost a dozen of her company's programs. They included two of the company's "flagship" products, Corel WordPerfect Office Suite 12, CorelDraw Suite 12, Painter, Quattro Pro, Presentations, Rave, Knockout, and a few of the company's newly-acquired former Jasc Paintshop products.

Tanya's best attributes include her love for using her PC to draw. She appeared to be quite an accomplished digital artist when creating her design of an ad using CorelDraw and Painter. Scribbling on a Wacom Table as her combo mouse-stylus, she immediately went to work designing her ad using brushstrokes, text, photos and clipart. She slowed at each step to illustrate how she

touched up, rendered and used tools to mask, cut, layer and other graphics designer techniques.

Using WordPerfect, her speech centered on the product's compatibility and affordability, and capability. Her confidence was also exhibited during the presentation when she showed an excellent feature of WP which "mimicked" a Microsoft Word simulation for Word users. She demonstrated its ease of use, "real-time preview formatting strengths before committing to them. Much of her WordPerfect demonstration centered around comparing word processing strong-points when matched with Word. A number of the group's WordPerfect users were thrilled that their #1 word processing program keeps improving in a Corel

BLUETOOTH

What is this "Bluetooth" I keep hearing about and do I need it?

Whenever something like a mouse or keyboard is connected to your computer,

there are protocols and standards in place so that the computer can talk to the keyboard and it operates properly. The same scenario also applies to anything that connects to a computer or other electronics

around your home. Your TV needs to know how the cable signal is formatted so that you get the sound and video. Bluetooth is a wireless protocol that allows electronics to communicate. Bluetooth goes beyond your computer to integrate electronics across a wide spectrum. Bluetooth operates on two levels. The first is that all Bluetooth devices operate on the same radio frequency and speak the same language. Secondly they all share the same procedures in exchanging data and verifying the data is received. That is sort of like being able to speak the language and know the customs so no one misunderstands.



Bluetooth a standard developed and employed by close to 1,000 different companies. This protocol would allow you to take a cell phone, get into a car with a Bluetooth radio and transfer the call to the stereo so your hands are left free.

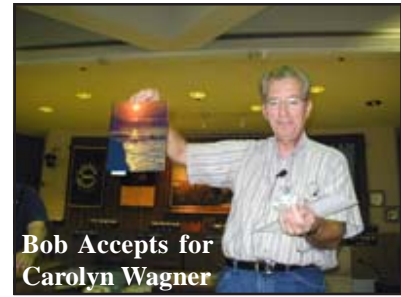

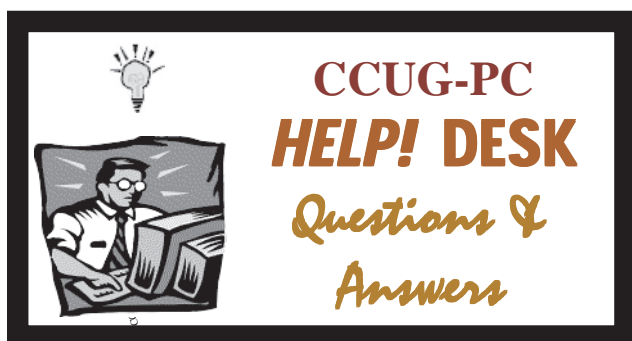

Q *I have a lot of America Online e-mail saved on my computer. I want to unload that e-mail to a file so that I can access it after I stop subscribing to AOL. Can you suggest a technique or product that will enable me to do that in AOL 9.0?*

A After more than a decade of leaving its users unable to transfer their e-mail from its proprietary software, AOL switched gears a while back.

AOL now lets its customers read and send its e-mail using software such as MS Outlook, Outlook Express and Eudora.

For example, in Outlook you just click on *Tools and E-mail accounts* and then set up an AOL account using IMAP, OR Internet Message Access Protocol. AOL customers get detailed instructions for making the switches by using the keyword *Microsoft Outlook Type Control +K* to call up the search box.

You might need to move your saved e-mail into different folders on AOL before you can use the software to retrieve archive messages, but this is a simple matter of dragging and dropping notes.

Remember that to drag and drop large numbers of messages, select the first one and then scroll down to the last one and then hold down the *Shift* key and click on it. This will paint all the e-mails (highlight) so that you can delete them or move them.

Q *I am confused about the new DVD formats, and in one recent article I've read was discussing them has only added to my confusion. In the article, it says someone has recorded photos to a DVD+R disc and that he isn't able to see them from any of his computers or his DVD player. It was mentioned that the disks which were needed should use ISO 9600 to "finalize" the DVD, and that it will then be able to play in other PCs as well as PlayStations and DVD players. Could it be that the DVD+R disc used was wouldn't work because only DVD-R compatible drives/players were available? Or is it perhaps that a DVD+R disc could be made to work in a DVD-R player if the disc is finalized?*

Taxes Made Free and Easy on the Internet

Gather up your receipts and W-2s, because it's tax time. But forget about sharpening your pencils and finding a calculator. If you use an online tax service, all of the forms and calculations are done for you. And it's free.

To encourage taxpayers to file electronically, the IRS, in conjunction with commercial tax preparation software companies, offers free e-filing. That is, as long as those individuals meet certain age, income, residency or other requirement.



To begin, you'll need an Internet connection and the necessary documentation (W-2s, 1099s, receipts, etc.). Then go to the IRS' Free File site (<http://www.irs.gov/efile/article/0,,id=118986,00.html>) and click the Start Now! button. This leads you to a list of Web sites providing free e-filing service. Click "more details" for information on individual sites' qualification requirements. It also includes pricing information, if you don't qualify.

But you don't have to read the requirements of each site. Click Guide Me to a Service! This brings up a form that asks about age, adjusted gross income, state of residence and other questions. With that information, the IRS directs you to those sites for which you qualify.

This year, several sites, including H&R Block, have opened free e-filing to all taxpayers. TaxACT and TurboTax, which are tax preparation programs, are also providing free e-filing with no restrictions.

Regardless of the service you choose, you must begin with the link on the IRS' Web site. If you go directly to a company's Web site, you will pay for the service.

Many sites offer different tiers of service. Generally, the free e-filing gives you access to a basic level. This usually includes access to forms and technical support through e-mail.

If you've never used tax preparation software, you may be in for a shock. Instead of filling out an online version of the 1040, the sites conduct an online interview. The interviews are filled with easy-to-understand but very detailed

questions about income, interest earned, stock options, real estate holdings and so on.

The programs do a good job of holding your hand. But if you're used to zipping through the forms, you may find the numerous questions tedious and repetitive. If you get tired or bored, you can stop at any time and return later.

If you used an online tax preparation site last year, you might be able to import last year's income tax information into this year's forms. But you'll have to use the same site you used the previous year.



Sites may urge you to upgrade to a higher tier of service. But you are under no obligation to do so. However, you may find the basic tier inadequate.

For example, H&R Block offers 50 percent off its premium online tax program. This gives you free 24-hour technical support, access to an interactive video library, a free phone or e-mail session with a tax advisor, and other tools.

Most sites will import your federal data and electronically file your state tax forms for a fee. The cost varies from \$6 to \$20. If you want to fill out the forms yourself, some states allow you to file electronically. You can get state Web links from the IRS for more information at: <http://www.irs.gov/efile/article/0,,id=97558,00.html>

One of the great advantages of filing electronically is a faster refund. Your bank account could see a nice bump in less than two weeks.

And your return will not be lost in the mail. You'll receive an electronic acknowledgement when the IRS receives your return.

Finally, the companies listed on the IRS Web site agree to abide by rules and standards. So your return should be accurate and secure.

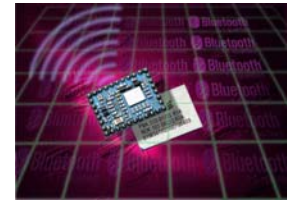

Later you could take that same phone and possibly transfer contact information from the phone to a computer.

This is just one example.

Bluetooth can be found in phones, keyboards, PDA's, and even stereo headphones. It could potentially show up anywhere you have a wire to connect two devices now.

I've use Ulead VideoStudio 7, Pinnacle Systems Studio 7, and Sonic MyDVD software.

I really hope you respond, since this whole DVD+R versus DVD-R issue has been a major headache for me and continues to be a problem for a number of my friends and family.

A Wow, Anybody who uses that potent collection of different home-oriented audio and video software should be answering questions, not asking them. Let's hope I can add light instead of just more heat to the massively confusing issue of recording CDs or DVDs on a computer and then playing them on conventional video equipment.

As you suspect, there are a fairly large number of DVD players, particularly older models, some of which have security features that block them from seeing the boot sector of a home-brewed DVD.

You seem to have such a dud in your living room. When one scans major lists of DVD players by capability, it turns out that there are some machines that will be able to see a DVD-R that has been finalized but not a DVD+R and so on. Go figure. Meanwhile, new players are built by companies aiming directly at home hobby discmakers and include coverage for the whole ball of wax. You can drive yourself nuts reviewing product models at places like www.videohelp.com, but look on the top of the left side of that Web site for "what is" DVD.

Click on that for a useful glossary of DVD flavors and what machines they work with. 😊

market share that once dominated the application marketplace. Nevertheless, WordPerfect could not hide its head as strongly as it competes with a huge office suite currently dominated by Microsoft.

Tanya rounded out the presentation with Paint programs which is tightly integrated with her Corel products. One of the products included Corel Knockout--a powerful "masking" program that Tanya used to mask fine details such as whale with water spray and animals with ❄️

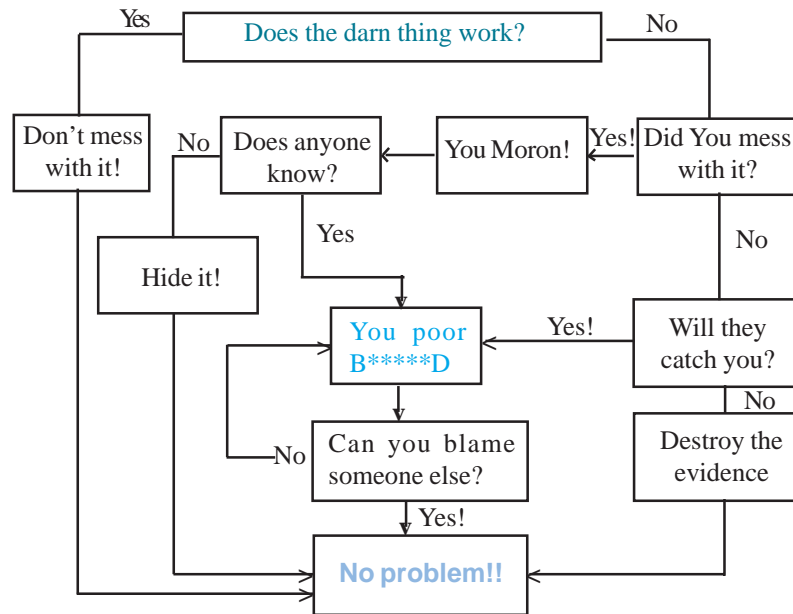

Updating Registry without rebooting

Here's how to update the Registry without rebooting Windows:

Press Ctr-Alt-Del, select Explorer, and click End Task. When Windows asks if you want to Shut Down, click no, then click End Task at the next prompt. Soon you should see the Start menu and Task Bar reappear as Windows starts the Explorer shell again.

Removing listing of programs from Add/Remove

If you remove an installed program and its files by deleting the files, it may still show up in the Add/Remove programs list through the control panel. In order to remove it from the list (so you don't need to re-install in order to just remove it again).

(Warning: This procedure, of course, this is either for the skilled registry "pruner" or the nervey, confident avid enthusiast who knows how to back up his registry and/or is capable of restoring the registry if needed!)

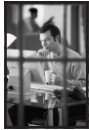
